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Kindergarten Round-Up

Ames Christian School's Academic Kindergarten/Early Kindergarten parent information meeting will be held on Tuesday, February 26, at 6:30 p.m. in the Kindergarten room at A m e s Christian School. Kindergarten Round-Up will be held on March 11 from 9:00 to 10:30 a.m.

Ames Christian offers personalized Christian education with academic excellence provided by gifted, mentoring teachers in a safe, disciplined learning environment. The parent meeting will begin with Peggy Smith, ACS Administrator, welcoming the parents and providing information about the school's structure, mission,

One Room Schoolhouse

History was brought to life for Ames Christian School's Kindergarten through second grade classes when 99-year-old Esther Wick came to speak about her experiences teaching during the 1930s. The class was able to give back to Wick, who is still an active volunteer in Story County, by celebrating her 99th

birthday. Wick told the children about what it was like to teach in a one-room school house and answered the students' many questions. She told them about starting the schoolhouse stove, living with area families and how students traveled to school.



She said that each morning she would read from the Bible, share a psalm and scripture and area pastors would speak once a week to the children. Common illnesses of the time were the grip (fever and cough), influenza, whooping cough, small pox

and measles. Wick taught for eight years in various area schools. She stopped teaching when she got married because at the time it was state law for female teachers to resign their position when they became married.

"It's important for students to learn about

other generations outside of their own," said Kindergarten teacher Carol Baedke.

The students ended the day with birthday cake and celebrated with cards and happy smiles.

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Giving Back Through Service Projects

Ames Christian School believes it is more blessed to give than receive. We want our students to experience the joy of giving, serving, and loving others by participating in various service projects all year. Throughout His life on earth Jesus served others. We desire to honor Him by serving, sharing, and giving to those less fortunate. Matthew 25:40 says "The King will reply, 'I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me.'

Ames Christian School Preschool participated in Operation Christmas Child this year. This annual project, organized by Samaritan's Purse, collects shoeboxes of small gifts and distributes these boxes to children in need around the world. Since 1993, more than 77 million children in over 130 countries have received these simple treasures and been introduced to Jesus Christ through a booklet about the Gospel written in the child's own language.

The children enjoyed going to the store with their parents and picking out something that a boy or girl their age would like.

The children had a Shoe Box Packing Party; they assembled eleven

boxes as a classroom activity. The boxes were labeled and wrapped for a preschool aged boy or girl. The children also drew pictures to be included inside the boxes. The boxes along with money for the postage were taken to the Operation Christmas Child collection site in Ames.



ACS K-6th Graders desire to bring hope to others through an organization called World Concern. World Concern works in a variety of places, but excels at providing relief in areas not serviced by other agencies. In many of the countries where they work, the people who live there face significant political or religious restrictions. Their Christian commitment is "extending Christ's love to the poorest." In everything they do, they strive to help communities develop in a

lasting way."

This year instead of having a Christmas gift exchange in the classrooms, each student brought a \$5 to \$10 donation for World Concern. The students chose to use their donations to buy pigs and needed supplies since Iowa is the top hog producer in the U.S.A. Needy families in Myanmar will receive the pigs we purchase to provide an income for them and food for hungry girls and boys. Enough money was raised to buy five pigs and the needed supplies for these pigs.

Finally, Mrs. Baedke's kindergarten class collected and delivered baby items to Ames Birthright. The students helped sort the donations and place them on the appropriate shelves. Birthright provides loving support, resources, maternity and baby items to those in need in our community.
